



# Providing Net Gain for Biodiversity Supplementary Planning Document (SPD)



Strategic Environmental Assessment Screening May 2021

1.1 The purpose of this report is to determine whether the *Providing Net Gain in Biodiversity Supplementary Planning Document* (the SPD) requires a Strategic Environmental Assessment (SEA) in accordance with the Environmental Assessment of Plans and Programmes Regulations 2004, as amended by The Environmental Assessments and Miscellaneous Planning (Amendment) (EU Exit) Regulations 2018 (the SEA Regs).

#### Legislative Background

- 1.2 The Environmental Assessment of Plans and Programmes Regulations 2004 (as amended) have been followed to produce this screening statement and the paragraph numbers for relevant regulations are identified within the assessment.
- 1.3 In addition, Paragraph: 008 of the Planning Practice Guidance Reference ID: 11-008-20140306 has been considered. This states that supplementary planning documents may in exceptional circumstances require a strategic environmental assessment if they are likely to have significant environmental effects that have not already have been assessed during the preparation of the relevant strategic policies. This screening statement considers impacts which are not already assessed within the Harrogate District Local Plan Sustainability Appraisal 2018 and Sustainability Appraisal Addendum 3 Main Modifications July 2019.

### **Purpose and Content of the SPD**

- 1.4 The purpose of the SPD is to provide more detailed guidance on how development schemes can provide a net gain in biodiversity value and specifically how major development schemes can ensure they meet criteria E of the Local Plan Policy NE3. The SPD includes:
  - What is meant by biodiversity 'no net loss' and biodiversity accounting;
  - Guidance on how biodiversity value should be considered in the development of a scheme:
  - Clarification on what can be counted towards biodiversity value;
  - What evidence is required to support an application;
  - A 'map of strategic significance' which identifies areas which should be given a particular weighting in biodiversity value calculations;
  - Guidance on how to accommodate protected species; and
  - An overview of how no net loss will be secured by planning condition and legal agreement.

#### **Screening Process**

1.5 The screening opinion assessment is undertaken in two parts: the first part will assess whether the SPD requires SEA and the second part of the assessment will consider whether the SPD is likely to have a significant effect on the environment, using criteria drawn from Schedule 1 of the SEA Regulations.

Natural England, Historic England and The Environment Agency were consulted on the conclusions of the draft SEA screening on the 30th March and asked to provide comment by the 5th May 2021. No issues were raised.

However it is only interim guidance on how to deliver net gain and will likely be superceded by the requirements proposed in the Environment Bill and subsequent legislation. The volume of projects it will influence is limited to those coming forward in accordance with the Local Plan over the next one or two years.

The Harrogate District has areas of landscape recognised at national and international level but development schemes will be in accordance with the Local Plan which seeks to avoid impacts on these areas. The SPD requires that biodiversity compensation is not provided on areas with national or international protection. In addition the SPD requires that any enhancement or compensation is approved by the council ecologist to avoid negative impacts on the wider landscape.

#### Conclusion

- Table 2 identifies that the SPD will have a beneficial impact on the natural environment over a long period of 30 years, however the scale of the impact over and above the framework set out in the Local Plan is very limited. In addition, the SPD will provide interim guidance until the provisions of the Environment Bill, subsequent legislation and guidance is provided.
- 1.7 It is concluded that the SPD is not likely to have significant environmental effects.
