Question no.	26	Paragraph	a				
Why is it necessary for Selby to plan further, when it refers to AECOM which was produced in 2011? That plan did not take into account significant numbers of farm wind turbines, 2 incinerators at Eggborough and Kellington and several anaerobic digesters in the immediate area. In fact, planning applications for farm turbines alone exceed 40 in number up to the present time. Plans are afoot for applications for wind turbines in excess of 600 feet. Surely there is a limit to what we are expected to endure. In view of Selby District's Mission Statement, to provide a distinctive rural district with an outstanding environment, a diverse economy and attractive, vibrant towns and villages where residents would have a high-quality of life, I cannot see that the 2 fit comfortably together!							
Drax Power Station has already converted part of their site to bio-mass and wish to extend this further. This would create, at least 1000MW of energy - why would we even consider 100 turbines in excess of 400 feet each with a capacity of only 250MW? Eggborough Power Station, under its new owners, wishes to convert some of their generators to bio-mass. If this goes ahead, our area will be providing far more of the area's renewal energy capacity than it would need by the year 2050. In relation to existing turbines which have been built closer than 2 km to residential properties, what is the cumulative effect to those residents with regards to turbine noise, flickering, extra HGV movements during development and a substantive reduction in house prices? All these things are factual and not imagined.							
In relation to the application for Woodlane Wind Farm, I fail to understand why residents of the surrounding area have now been subjected to stress and worry for over 5 years. It has cost thousands of pounds to the present time in fighting the application and yet the applicants can take whatever time they wish to provide the necessary information to support their application.

Paragraph: e

Comment: With more and more single turbines being built, it is necessary for a policy about how close these can be sited to homes, road, pathways, public areas and areas used for recreational activity. Whilst 2 km would be ideal, it may not be feasible so it would be better to equate the distance from homes to the size of the turbine as these get ever bigger! However, a 2 km zone should be maintained for the 145m turbines and it ought to be much larger for any 200m turbines. Also the number of turbines should be carefully managed and their cumulative effect on the community.

Paragraph: f

Comment: It is important that any work done has value and deals with genuine issues. Any policies must be cost effective in dealing with issues that affect numerous planning applications. Candidate subjects that are current include

- · Cumulative issues of incineration traffic and air quality
- · Solar farms visual impact and enclosure of open space
- Wind turbine cumulative visual impacts

We are particularly concerned about the cumulative effect on our environment of the numerous schemes already in existence in my small area of Beal. We already have 3 anaerobic digester plants which have a big visual impact as well as creating extra HGV journeys during construction and also, we presume, for bringing in the fuel. Also, the local fields have been taken over by the crop grown to feed these digesters, what about the crops that used to be grown in these fields. We have had no

information about the impact of these projects and have only found out bit by bit what they actually are. In addition we are under threat of huge wind farms in our area and have been for many years.

Additional Comments - The cards seem to be stacked against the residents and we hope that PLANSelby will address this issue.
